

Dr. Richard Wright was the founding Director of International Business Studies in the Faculty of Management at McGill University, Canada. He has also held the Jackson Distinguished Professorship at the Graduate School of Management, Willamette University, and the E. Claiborne Robins Distinguished University Chair in the Robins School of Business, University of Richmond. He is currently a Distinguished Visiting Scholar at the Anderson School at UCLA; and he serves frequently as a visiting scholar at other leading management schools and training centers around the world. Dr. Wright holds a B.A. degree from Dartmouth College; an M.B.A. degree from the Amos Tuck School of Business Administration; and a Doctorate in international management from Indiana University. Dr. Wright's publications include eleven books and research monographs, and 60 book chapters and journal articles, mainly on Asian business and management. He has organized and led business study-abroad programs to fifteen countries. A co-founder of the annual McGill Conferences on International Entrepreneurship, he is also president of an international management consulting and training firm specializing in Asia/Pacific. His current research interests focus on the new opportunities and challenges facing small firms in the globalizing economy, on which he has edited several books and special journal issues. Dr. Wright is a citizen of three countries (Canada, U.S., Panama), married, with two teen-age sons.
